PHILEMON: A FAITHFUL CHRISTIAN MAN Philemon 1 – 7

Introduction:

A. Prior to his conversion, and return to Philemon, Onesimus was a runaway slave. He escaped from Philemon's authority to avoid punishment for stealing goods from Philemon (Philemon 18-19). Paul sent Onesimus back to Philemon with a letter urging Philemon to forgive Onesimus and treat him as a fellow Brother in Christ. Paul urged Philemon to treat Onesimus as if he were Paul himself – with love and kindness (Philemon 16-17).

I. <u>The Commitment of Philemon</u> (vv. 1-2)

- A. Philemon was so committed to Christ that he was counted as "dearly beloved" (v. 1)
- **B.** Philemon was so committed to Christ that he was counted as a Labourer (worker for Christ (v. 1)
- **C.** Philemon was so committed to Christ that he supported his family in the work of Christ (v. 2)
- **D.** Philemon was so committed to Christ that he opened his home to the church (v. 2)

II. <u>The Basic Need of Philemon</u> (v. 3)

- **A. He Needed Grace** the flavor and blessings of God. The undeserved and unmerited favor and blessings of God.
- B. He Needed Peace peace of mind, undisturbed, quietness

III. <u>The Testimony of Philemon</u> (vv. 4-5)

A. Paul prayed for Philemon – "Always" because of his great Christian testimony (v. 4)
B. Paul's description of Philemon's great Testimony

IV. <u>The Need of Prayer for Philemon</u> (v. 6)

A. The sharing of your faith – "The communication of thy faith" (v. 6a) **B.** What are the good things? The finit of the Spirit

B. What are the good things? – The fruit of the Spirit

V. <u>The Love of Philemon</u> (v. 7)

- **A.** Philemon was a Christian man who loved everyone and proved it by helping others.
- **B.** Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. once stated, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is: What are you doing for others?"

Conclusion:

- A. Be committed to Christ Thank God for His grace and peace Maintain a Christian Testimony – Pray for yourself and others – Share your faith in God and love others as Christ loves you.
- B. Forgive Our Sins as We Forgive
