## FAST UNTO THE LORD Matthew 6:16-18

## **INTRODUCTION:**

Biblical Fasting involves prayer, and intense supplication before God – Humble and earnest request for help or mercy from God.

• "Moreover when ye fast, be not, as the hypocrites, of a sad countenance: for they disfigure their faces, that they may appear unto men to fast. Verily I say unto you, They have their reward" (Matthew 6:16).

In this message, we will study: (1) The Wrong Motive for Fasting, and (2) The Right Motive for Fasting:

  - A. The hypocrites disfigures their faces to show people they were fasting in attempts to look holy.

  - **D. Examples of Fasting in the Bible** (2 Sam 12:16; Dan 9:3; Esther 4:15-16; Neh 1:4; Matt 4:1-2; Luke 4:1-2; Acts 13:1-3; Acts 14:23)
